My name is Monica Dragony. I am married to Dale Dragony and we have three children, Claire, Zack, and Josh, and a granddaughter, Brianna. We have been members of Prince of Peace for approximately 15 years. When my son, Zack, was making his Confirmation was when we were first introduced to Prince of Peace. We were members of another small, new church and Zack was the only one in the class, so the leaders arranged for him to join Prince of Peace's Confirmation class. We began to attend Prince of Peace and the kids began to make friends, so we decided to make it our permanent church home.

The most memorable act of generosity that I can think of is when my boys came with me to visit my brother, who was in a long-term nursing facility due to a brain injury. We had to step out of the room while they changed his dressings, and as we were waiting in the hallway, Zack and his little brother went to look at the birds they had in a small aviary. An older woman begin talking to Zack. I did not hear the conversation, but I watched as my little six-year-old boy held this stranger's hand, nodded his head as she spoke, and replied back to her. It was after that whole incident that I found out from a nurse that the woman could not speak, but Zack said he could understand every word she said. I was proud and amazed that my young son was so generous and caring towards this woman and did not turn and flee from the situation.

My mother was always a generous person and, I would have to say, she is the one who showed me how to be generous and loving towards others. I remember one time, in high school, when the airports had closed due to a snow storm and many passengers were stranded with no place to sleep for the night. We lived about 15 minutes down the road from the airport. My mom drove to the airport to see if anyone would like to come to our house for warmth, food, and a bed to sleep in. At the time, as a teenager, I thought that was an outlandish idea. Now, as an adult, I look back and realize how generous she was, being willing to help someone in need no matter what.

Witnessing the care for others that was displayed through my son and mother helped me to realize that we are all children of God on this Earth that He created. We need to care for each other, love one another, and help one another.

In 2018, when the government shut down, and Dale, who was our sole provider for the family, was out of work, our Prince of Peace family reached out to see if we needed any financial assistance in day-to-day life. I felt that to be extremely touching because we weren't advertising a need for money or help. It was just a generous gesture that was extended in anticipation of the days to come.

God has given each of us a talent that is unique to you. When you are in a family, you help each other in any way you can. It could be through prayer, moral support, or monetary support. I invite each of you to show your generosity and share your talent in your church home of Prince of Peace.

lames 2:14-26

Faith without Works Is Dead

14 What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? 15 If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, 16 and one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill," and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? 17 So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead.

18 But someone will say, "You have faith and I have works." Show me your faith apart from your works, and I by my works will show you my faith. 19 You believe that God is one; you do well. Even the demons believe—and shudder. 20 Do you want to be shown, you senseless person, that faith apart from works is barren? 21 Was not our ancestor Abraham justified by works when he offered his son Isaac on the altar? 22 You see that faith was active along with his works, and faith was brought to completion by the works. 23 Thus the scripture was fulfilled that says, "Abraham believed God, and it was reckoned to him as righteousness," and he was called the friend of God. 24 You see that a person is justified by works and not by faith alone. 25 Likewise, was not Rahab the prostitute also justified by works when she welcomed the messengers and sent them out by another road? 26 For just as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is also dead.

Martin Luther was not a big fan of the Book of James. He didn't think it expressed the "nature of the Gospel," it appeared to contradict Paul's statements about justification by faith, and it didn't directly mention Christ. He wrote, "Therefore St James' epistle is really an epistle of straw, compared to these others, for it has nothing of the nature of the Gospel about it."

But let us not simply dismiss this epistle because Luther didn't regard it as highly as the other epistles. There are still great words to be gleaned from it.

Some might think that the reason Luther didn't care for it is due to its focus on good works. Let me state clearly that Martin Luther never said we should NOT do good works. Justification by grace through faith is good news that states that it is God's doing, and not ours, that we are set free!

We are set free to be Christ to our neighbor. Luther says God doesn't need our good works, but our neighbor does. Good works are good, but that are bad if they appear to be necessary to earn the love of God.

When I was in seminary, a curriculum revision took place. The seminary realized that most of the students in seminary were there to work toward ordination and become pastors or lay leaders in the church. A small group were there to further their education to later go on to teach or attain additional degrees. Because of this, the seminary offered students the choice for most classes to either receive a letter grade for the class (as had been the method for many years) or take the class "Pass-Fail."

This was freeing for me. I could take a class without worrying that I was trying to earn the favor of the teacher and give back to the teacher what was needed to "ace" the class. Now I just needed to get a passing grade. Now there was still a bit of tension there, but not as much as before. I found that the focus could be on what I could benefit from the class to better myself to serve as a pastor than earning the praise of the teacher.

I believe that once we realize we have already been given a passing grade with God, we can focus on what God wants us to do and to be. What God wants us to be do and be, Luther says, is to be God's hands and feet. We are called to be the ones who do good works in response to what God has done for us.

What are we called to do when there is nothing that we HAVE to do?

Give thanks to God for Jesus Christ, who sets us free from the bondage of sin, so that we might care for one another, love one another, and live in peace.

Let us pray: Thank you, God for giving us a passing grade. May we live our lives in gratitude, and do the good works you enable us and equip us to do. We pray this in Jesus' name. Amen.
