#### Peace Pavilion Highlights:

- We have commitments for 91% of the construction cost of the project and have received 62% of the funds for construction.
- When adding in ancillary items such as architect, financing, benches, audio/visual, etc. We have commitments for 85%
  of the total project (not including landscaping) and have received 60% of the funds.
- We had one family "step up" their commitment from Maple to Oak in October.
- We have about \$18,500 of remaining 2024 commitments expected to be received by the end of the year or about 3.5% more toward construction cost goal.
- We will need to recast our loan upon completion of construction and final payment. The more cash we get in by the end
  of the year the better to reduce our overall financing charge (currently estimated at \$43,000).
- Landscaping design is coming along well and we will have further opportunities for donations in the future.



Psalm 80:1-7

Prayer for Israel's Restoration

To the leader: on Lilies, a Covenant. Of Asaph. A Psalm.

1 Give ear, O Shepherd of Israel, you who lead Joseph like a flock! You who are enthroned upon the cherubim, shine forth

- 2 before Ephraim and Benjamin and Manasseh. Stir up your might, and come to save us!
- 3 Restore us, O God; let your face shine, that we may be saved.
- 4 O Lord God of hosts, how long will you be angry with your people's prayers?
- 5 You have fed them with the bread of tears, and given them tears to drink in full measure.
- 6 You make us the scorn of our neighbors; our enemies laugh among themselves.
- 7 Restore us, O God of hosts; let your face shine, that we may be saved.

Charlemagne ruled as King over much of the Roman Empire in the ninth century. When he died, his funeral procession of came to the cathedral. They were shocked to find the gate barred by the bishop. "Who comes?" shouted the bishop.

The he<mark>ralds answered, "Charlemagne, Lord and King of the Holy Roman Empire!" Answering for God, the bishop replied, "Him I know not! Who comes? The bishop asked again"</mark>

The heralds, a bit shaken, answered, "Charles the Great, a good and honest man of the earth!"

Again the bishop answered, "Him I know not. Who comes?"

Now completely crushed, the heralds say, "Charles, a lowly sinner, who begs the gift of Christ." "Him I know," the bishop replied. "Enter! Receive Christ's gift of life!"

It is only when in humility we see ourselves as nothing that God can create something out of nothing. When we stop and think that God in Christ loves us by coming to earth to bring us back to God, we cannot but be overwhelmed with gratitude.

Our humble God comes to humble people like the shepherds who know they are outcasts – they were regularly reminded of it. Time and time again, God lifts up the lowly to do God's will.

- The great prophet, Isaiah, confessed, "I am a man of unclean lips."
- The great Christian, Paul, confessed that he was "chief of sinners."
- In 1979 a Roman Catholic nun, Mother Teresa, was given the Nobel Peace Prize. She accepted the prize with the comment, "I am unworthy."

We hear it in Mary's song as she sings about how God lifts up the lowly. The message is good news for all. God's desire is to restore us to the right relationship – children of God, created and totally dependent on God for life itself, who are created to love and worship God, love and serve each other.

Once we stop trying to do God's job and live as God created us to live, there is healing and wholeness that come. That is the purpose – to restore a right relationship between us and God. And the good news is that this is God's doing! Not ours!

Maybe we shouldn't be surprised that the lowly shepherds, a back-woods carpenter and his teenage bride to be are the ones who hear the good news.

Let us Pray. Almighty God, you send your Son to bring us back to you. Your son comes not to condemn but set us free. Re-create us to be what and who you want us to be. We pray this in Jesus' name. Amen.



PROFILE STORY Lia Noukas Lia Staaf

Lia was born in Tallinn, Estonia. She lived in Estonia until she was 11 years old. The Soviet Union invaded her country, denounced her father who was an Estonian Police Officer as an enemy of the state and sentenced him to Siberia. Her father hid at her grandmother's farm for two months until the Germans occupied Estonia from 1941-1944. In 1944, the Soviet Union then invaded Estonia again. Lia's family tried to flee to Sweden on a fishing boat but the German military seized their boat and forced them onto a ship to Germany with other Estonians. During and after World War II, they lived in various refugee camps in Germany for the next four years.

They ended up in the French Occupation zone in Trier. Her mother obtained permission for the family to move to an Estonian camp in Kleinneubach in the American zone, where Estonian refugees had established schools. In 1948, Congress approved the Displaced Persons Act to allow refugees to enter the U.S. At age 16, a Lutheran Church in Lucky, Ohio sponsored the family and lent them money to come to the United States. They lived in Genoa, a small farming community at the time. Lia is grateful to that church and to the people who helped them along the way.

Early in life, her schooling was interrupted often due to the war. After immigrating to The United States, Lia attended and graduated from Genoa High School; Bowling Green State University and also Western Reserve University (now Case). She majored in history as an undergraduate then earned a Master's Degree in Library Science. She met her husband, Bud, in a medieval history class in college!

Lia has had a career that spans many skills. She has worked as a babysitter, an elevator operator, a sales clerk for a bakery, library assistant at Cleveland Public Library, and spent most of her working life as a middle school librarian /media specialist in the Lakewood Public School System. Lia has two adult daughters, Monica and Norma. Monica and her partner, Glen, live in Massachusetts. Norma and her husband live in Idaho.

She was a member of Faith Lutheran Church in Lakewood for many years. The church began to lose members. Several POP members who were friends from College Club West, invited her to a tea. Lia fell in love with POP and joined about 16 years ago. She volunteers as a greeter, attends Bible Study, and is involved with Sisters in Spirit.

Her energy is put to good use in her hobbies and interests. Reading has been her lifelong passion. She enjoys meeting people of all ages and sending them cards. She participates in College Club West; the Rocky River Historical Society; American Nationalities Movement; the Cleveland Museum of Art; and the Rocky River Senior Center. Lia enjoys attending concerts and plays. She has traveled to all 50 states, Puerto Rico, and 22 countries! Until recently, she went to the Chautauqua Institute every summer to attend lectures and cultural activities.

Something that people may not know about Lia is that she played in Bridge tournaments for many years and is a Silver Life Master in Duplicate Bridge! During many services and events at our church, you will always notice Lia engaging with many in our congregation. She has a Big and Loving Heart for people! Lia always seeks to Give God the Glory!
