



Love Inc. 2024





OUTDOOR WORSHIP (PEACE PAVILION) COMMITTEE

The Outdoor Worship Committee was established in 2023 to take the next steps with usage of the Prince of Peace exterior campus. Our sole focus in 2023 was to assess the feasibility of an outdoor worship space based on the conceptual design work completed in 2022 and 2023. The committee consisted of Phil Sprague (chair), Jim Dickey, Evan Saunders, Mary Meadows, Dineen Terstage, Pastor Charlie Woodward, Steve Zinram. The committee met frequently during the year in conjunction with our architect, John Faile and Associates.

Tactically, we have made good progress on the Peace Pavilion in 2023. During the year we:

- -Completed the preliminary design of the Peace Pavilion working with architect John Faile and Associates. This effort was funded by a generous grant from the Prince of Peace General Endowment Fund.
- -Obtained design approval from the City of Westlake.
- -Obtained a directional cost estimate within our budget of \$500,000 from Sciarappa Construction of Avon Lake.
- -Completed a "silent" capital campaign which indicated several members are willing to contribute. We estimate that we have secured \$200,000 in funding over a three-year period. In addition, we have expanded the Capital Campaign seeking to raise a total of \$500,000. Obtained Church Council approval to proceed to a special congregational vote on February 11th at the Annual Meeting.
- -Released a Request for Proposal document to four qualified vendors to select a contractor. Received initial donations for the Peace Pavilion (Thank You!!!).

We have continued to refine our design to meet our requirements both aesthetically and financially.




Travel Quest Event, The Hunchback of Notre Dame!

Jonah 3:1-10

Conversion of Nineveh

The word of the Lord came to Jonah a second time, saying, 2 "Get up, go to Nineveh, that great city, and proclaim to it the message that I tell you." 3 So Jonah set out and went to Nineveh, according to the word of the Lord. Now Nineveh was an exceedingly large city, a three days' walk across. 4 Jonah began to go into the city, going a day's walk. And he cried out, "Forty days more, and Nineveh shall be overthrown!" 5 And the people of Nineveh believed God; they proclaimed a fast, and everyone, great and small, put on sackcloth.

6 When the news reached the king of Nineveh, he rose from his throne, removed his robe, covered himself with sackcloth, and sat in ashes. 7 Then he had a proclamation made in Nineveh: "By the decree of the king and his nobles: No human being or animal, no herd or flock, shall taste anything. They shall not feed, nor shall they drink water. 8 Human beings and animals shall be covered with sackcloth, and they shall cry mightily to God. All shall turn from their evil ways and from the violence that is in their hands. 9 Who knows? God may relent and change his mind; he may turn from his fierce anger, so that we do not perish."

10 When God saw what they did, how they turned from their evil ways, God changed his mind about the calamity that he had said he would bring upon them; and he did not do it.

If you have time (it doesn't take long since it is only 4 chapters long), read the book of Jonah.

Jonah tries to run from God's call to go to Ninevah. Instead, he jumps on a boat to Tarshish to run from God. Jonah knows exactly what he had done - he tried to run from God, but he didn't run far enough. Jonah is thrown overboard by the terrified sailors, and the storm subsides. On his way to the bottom of the sea and to certain death, Jonah is swallowed by a big fish and in the belly of this fish Jonah relents. After three days Jonah is coughed up head over heels on the sand. He reluctantly goes to Nineveh, believing all the time that this is a big waste of time.

Jonah walks through this enormous city calling out a simple message. There is no call to repentance, no message of God's love, only a threat, "In forty days Nineveh will be destroyed!" It seems as if Jonah is making his message as offensive and as blunt as he possibly can. It seems as if he was looking for a reaction – a reaction of disbelief and rejection from the people of Nineveh. "You want to hear good news," Jonah says, "Well, you have come to the wrong church! 40 days and Ninevah will be destroyed - have a nice day!"

Much to Jonah's dismay, a miracle happens. The entire city from the king down to the poorest peasant believed God's message. Even the sheep and cattle are involved. Everyone wears sackcloth and ashes and prays that God will not destroy them. Can you imagine such a sight? Can you imagine Jonah's surprise and shock?

In spite of his reluctance,

despite of his half-hearted attempt at speaking God's message,

regardless of his lousy attitude that the people of Nineveh weren't worth it,

and apart from his rather poor sermon, the whole city falls on its knees in repentance and prayer. In fact, we are told that it took three days to walk through Nineveh from one side to the other and Jonah had only walked for one day. Most of the city hadn't even heard Jonah's message personally, perhaps hearing it only from neighbors and friends. Yet the response is overwhelming.

Jonah's half-hearted efforts resulted in Nineveh's wholehearted response. Jonah was wrong. People like that DO change. The one person in the whole story who found it difficult to change was Jonah himself. Jonah is so angry; he would rather just die. He has more sympathy for a shrub that provided shade one day and dies the next than a city of over a hundred thousand inhabitants. Jonah becomes angry because God is not. Jonah wanted justice not grace, punishment not forgiveness.

What are we to make of this whole story about Jonah? This is a story of God's love and mercy.

Ross Barlett writes these words about this lesson:

For some of us, a disconcerting message in this saga - at least from one point of view - is the notion of God changing God's mind. The text clearly says, God saw their repentance and that they turned from their evil ways and God's mind was changed. There are many traditional branches of theology that turn pale at such a notion. Lest there be any doubt, the message given to Jonah by God was not a warning. It was not, "do this or else." It was a clear statement of what would happen - namely, destruction. But God's mind is changed. When God does that, it tends to annoy good religious folk like us no end.


We get into the habit of assuming we have God all locked up. After all, we read the bible, we go to worship, we hear sermons, we pray we're supposed to be on God's wavelength. We may not control God but we have a pretty good handle on God's actions - or so we figure. Then God does something entirely out of the ordinary and we are not only surprised, but we may also be annoyed.

Let me say this - God may do something **different** but God is **not inconsistent**. What generally happens is that we haven't considered the parts of divine reality that we already knew but conveniently forgot. The Book of Jonah was recorded to respond to a narrowing of Israel's religious perspective, a forgetting that God was the God of all, and that God was AND IS a God of great mercy. This is a useful reminder. The history of Christianity is dotted with occasions when we have forgotten God's breadth. It is filled with examples when we have narrowed God's concerns to the edges of our own agenda. How often has God been portrayed as the God of our side, our race, our culture, our politics, and so on?

Jesus called people to follow him, down strange paths and into unexpected places. As you and I move into the future the options seem clear. Will we be open to God's call to us, regardless of how striking and improper it may seem? Or will we join Jonah and go and buy a ticket to Tarshish? Either way, we still have to deal with God.

God's is consistent, even when we are reluctant! God is gracious and merciful even in spite of our best or worst efforts.

Let us pray: Almighty God, thank you for sending a fish to save Jonah. Thank you for sending your Son to save us. We pray this in Jesus' name. Amen
